RESEARCHARTICLE Advancing community-engaged research during the COVID-19 pandemic: Insights from a social network analysis of the trans-LINK Network

Abstract

Collaboratore Collaboration across sectors is critical to address complex health problems, particularly during the current COVID-19 pandemic. We examined the ability to collaborate during the pandemic as part of a baseline evaluation of an intersectoral network of healthcare and community organizations established to improve the collective response to transgender (trans) persons who have been sexually assaulted (the trans-LINK Network). A validated social network analysis survey was sent to 119 member organizations in Ortario, Canado Survey respondents were asked, Has COVID-19 negatively affected your organization's ability to collaborate with other organizations on the support of trans survivors of sexual assault? and How has COVID-19 negatively affected your organization's ability to collaborate with other worganizations and the survey organization's assault? and How has COVID-19 negatively affected your organization's attivith the trans-LINK Network?. Data were analyzed using descriptive statistics. Seventy-eight member organizations participated in the survey (response rate = 66%). Most Our newest publication examines the ability of organizations within the Network to collaborate with each other during the COVID-19 pandemic. Organizational representatives also provided suggestions to prevent and address the challenges, barriers, and disruptions to serving trans survivors experienced during the pandemic. These insights were used to develop recommendations to advance the Network, in particular in the context of this and other public health emergencies.

The study was published in PLoS ONE and is freely available **<u>here</u>**. Thanks to those of you who participated in this study; we appreciate your valuable contributions!
